## Huldrych Zwingli (1484-1531)

- Born in Wildhaus, Switzerland on New Years Day, 1484 (7 weeks after Luther)
- Member of peasant class but father was the local bailiff
- Education was humanist focused - influenced by Erasmus' Greek NT and interest in ancient church fathers
- Interests included language, literature, and music
- Ordained as priest and served as chaplain to Swiss mercenary soldiers
- Becomes disillusioned with indulgences and the Swiss mercenary system - Pope not happy

- Conversion to Protestantism gradual, not marked by any known single revelation moment
- Influenced by Luther but not "Lutheran"
- Nearly dies in 1519 plague
- 1519-1531 - Pastor at Grossmuenster, Zurich
- Sixty-seven Articles influential in Zurich choosing Protestantism (1523)
- Dies in battle in 1531
- Remembered as a Reformer and a Swiss patriot


## Writings and Sermons

| Work | Driver / Cause | Key Points |

| The Clarity and <br> Certainty of the <br> Word of God (1522) | Began as a sermon <br> preached to Dominican <br> nuns at a convent | "We should hold the Word of God in the highest possible <br> esteem...and we should give to it a trust which we cannot give to any <br> other word. For the Word of God is certain and can never fail. It is <br> clear and will never leave us in darkness." |
| Sermon - The <br> Shepherd (1523) | Disputations over <br> whether Zurich should <br> stay Roman Catholic or <br> become Protestant | Contrasts Zwingli's thoughts on the proper role of a Pastor as <br> shepherd of the congregation with what he saw as weak church <br> leadership at the time |
| Sixty-Seven Articles <br> (1523) | Disputations over <br> whether Zurich should <br> stay Roman Catholic or <br> become Protestant | Puts forth principles of the Reformed faith in contrast to Roman <br> Catholicism <br> $-\quad$ Christ is the head of the church, the only high priest <br> $-\quad$ Mass is a remembrance of sacrifice, not a sacrifice <br> $-\quad$ Clerics who use Christ as a pretext for wealth and gain slander |

## Contrast with Luther



The Eucharist
Denies that the mass is a sacrifice and denies the priest's unique role but Christ's flesh is in, with, and under the bread.
"I'd rather drink blood with the papists than mere juice with the Zwinglians"

## Other Matters

- Worship - If not prohibited by the Bible, OK.
- God's rule - God is sovereign but Christians should focus on church and personal matters. Share the gospel and the rest will fall into place.


The Eucharist
Christ's body is in heaven. He is present only spiritually ("by the contemplation of faith") at the Eucharist.

## Other Matters

- Worship - If not called for by the Bible, not OK.
- God's rule - Extends over everything in life. Zwingli was much more involved in politics, economics, diplomacy, and war than Luther

Luke 2:19 - And he took bread, and gave thanks, and brake it, and gave unto them, saying, This is my body which is given for you: this do in remembrance of me.

## Heinrich Bullinger



- Heinrich Bullinger (1504-1575)
$>$ Successor to Zwingli as pastor at Grossmuenster, Zurich
$>$ Widely Influential in Zurich and across Europe
$\square$ Sermons
$\checkmark$ The Decades - Doctrinal contributed to spread of Reformation
$\square$ Writings
$\checkmark$ Second Helvetic [Swiss] Confession (1566)
$\checkmark \quad 12,000$ letters
